Purpose

MIDOCS was created to increase the number of Michigan residency slots, train residents to practice in underserved areas of the state, and help retain doctors in those communities after their training.

Cohort 4: FY22 Appropriations (10/1/21 – 9/30/22)

- Goal was to create 24 positions
- MIDOCs Requested was \$6.4M GF, IGT Match, and CMS Match = \$20.2M
- FY22 Appropriations
- House proposed \$5.1M, Senate proposed \$6.4M, and Governor proposed \$5.1M
- \$6.4M was appropriated in the final budget, creating 24 new residency slots.

Cohort 5: FY23 Appropriations (10/1/22 -9 /30/23)

- Goal is to create 24 positions
- MIDOCs Request was \$6.4M GF, IGT Match, and CMS Match = \$20.2M
- FY23 Appropriations
- House proposed \$6.4M, Senate proposed \$6.4M, and Governor proposed \$6.4M
- \$6.4M appropriated in final budget.
- MIDOCs is becoming well known and widely supported in the legislature and administration.
- Budget was completed early this year, but concern remains regarding timing for budget process and ability to recruit to residencies which will start early Fall... creates uncertainty with programs.

- MIDOCs Request was \$6.4M GF, IGT Match, and CMS Match = \$20.2M
- FY24 Appropriations
- House proposed \$6.4M, Senate proposed \$6.4M, and Governor proposed \$6.4M
- \$6.4M appropriated in final budget.
- MIDOCs is widely supported in the legislature and administration.

- 2. In the past, we've discussed increasing the loan repayment amount in order to make MIDOCs more appealing to medical students.

 - b. Are there other ideas we could pursue legislatively to make MIDOCs more appealing to medical students?



Transition of practice from Henry Ford-overseen outpatient and inpatient experience to experiences overseen by Ascension Providence Rochester Hospital faculty


Plan to transition "urban track" to "underserved track" with opportunities to work in rural communities

Urban Track...in a nutshell

- UT residents experience a *tailored curriculum* in our program that includes the same **core experience** with added highlights included for specific MIDOCs residents' career needs. Examples:
 - Electives at:
 - Brighton Center for Recovery (Addiction Medicine)
 - Wayne Health at 400 Mack (Urban Medicine)
 - Mobile Health Unit (Preventive Medicine)
 - MATEC (Midwest AIDS Training and Education Center)
 - Volunteer and Service Outreach:
 - Street Medicine
 - WSU Student Run Free Clinic
 - Nursing home and affordable senior living centers
 - Additional development opportunities residents may elect into:
 - GLUE (Global Health and Urban Equity) program at WSU (2 currently enrolled)
 - AHEC (Michigan Area Health Education Center) curriculum (none currently enrolled, will be required in the curriculum for class that begins in 2024)

Tailored Curriculum

Making sure residents are ready for whatever is next!



- Our current UT grads are working in a variety of settings (e.g., Indian Health Services, FQHC, rural Michigan) and it made us realize there is no "one size fits all" for serving the underserved.
- UT residents will work one-on-one with their faculty to create a curriculum that best prepares them to do the job they want after graduation. Here are some examples that have already happened for our grads:
 - Interested in working in Detroit after grad? How about a rotation at Wayne Health in Midtown Detroit and a Street Medicine Elective?
 - Looking to go rural? How about the Mackinac Island elective and a nursing home experience in Oakland Township?
 - Interested in working in infectious disease? How about certification in HIV medicine and experience at an HIV clinic in Detroit?

Urban Track: Current grads

- Dr. Steele at American Indian Health Services in Detroit (1 yr)
- Dr. Dukaj starting at Cornerstone Medical Group in Macomb county (starting this summer)
- Dr. Kazanowski at rural FQHC in northern Michigan (1 yr)
- Dr. Johnson just signed at Saginaw, Michigan (starts October 2024)

Preventive Medicine Residency

- Two residents per year
- First-year residents complete a transitional year at Ascension Providence Rochester Hospital, then complete their two-year preventive medicine residency
- All PM residents must complete an MPH, unless they have previously completed an MPH. The MPH is hosted by WSUSOM's Department of Family Medicine and Public Health Sciences



 There are currently two PGY-3s, one PGY-2 and two PGY-1s (currently enrolled in the transitional year) in the PM residency. The first class graduated in June 2023

Family Medicine Urban Track

- Up to four residents/year
- Primary clinical site: CHASS (FQHC). Inpatient site to change from HFH to APRH in 2022
- Designed for physicians with strong interest in providing primary care to underserved populations in urban or rural settings and a commitment to community health

Preventive Medicine

- Newly ACGME-accredited in 2019: Initial accreditation status
- The first residents graduated in June 2023
- 1-year TY prerequisite
- 2-year program to prepare physicians for leadership roles in preventive medicine, health-care management, clinical epidemiology and public health at the federal, state or local level
- Collaboration with MI Department of Corrections, Wayne and Detroit County Health Departments, and 2 FQHCs
- Graduates obtain MPH from WSU's Dept. of Family Medicine and Public Health Sciences


